RECTOR OF ANDALAS UNIVERSITY,

Considering

- : a. that the curriculum is the further elaboration of  
The vision and mission of the Faculty of Law, Universitas Andalas, are based on the development of science, technology and the national legal system;
- b. that the curriculum is the main element in the education system, so the Faculty of Law, Andalas University requires renewal in order to fulfill learning outcomes based on the Indonesian National Qualifications Framework;
- c. that the Rector's Regulation Number 22 of 2012 concerning the Undergraduate Program Curriculum at the Faculty of Law, Andalas University needs to be adjusted to the development of the teaching of Law so that it needs to be replaced;
- d. that based on the Agreement of the Cooperation Board of the Dean of the Faculty of Law of State Universities throughout Indonesia, the Workshop of the Faculty of Law of Andalas University and the Consideration of the Senate of the Faculty of Law of Andalas University, the Faculty of Law has agreed on changes to the Undergraduate Program Curriculum of the Faculty of Law of Andalas University;
- e. that based on the considerations as referred to in letter a, letter b, letter c and letter d, it is necessary to establish a Rector's Regulation on the Curriculum of the Undergraduate Program of the Faculty of Law, Andalas University;

HAS DECIDED :

To enact : REGULATION OF THE RECTOR OF ANDALAS UNIVERSITY ABOUT THE UNDERGRADUATE PROGRAM CURRICULUM OF THE FACULTY OF LAW, ANDALAS UNIVERSITY.

## CHAPTER I GENERAL PROVISIONS

### Article

1 In this Regulation what is meant by:

1. Rector is the Rector of Andalas University.
2. Dean is the Dean of the Faculty of Law, Universitas Andalas.
3. Faculty is the Faculty of Law, Andalas University.
4. Sections are academic executors to manage human resources and course management for the development of legal science.
5. Students are students of the Faculty of Law, Andalas University.
6. Bachelor Program is the Bachelor Program of the Faculty of Law, Andalas University.
7. The Core Curriculum is a group of study materials and lessons that must be covered in one study program formulated in a nationally applicable curriculum.
8. The Institutional Curriculum is a group of personality development courses, a group of courses characterized by educational objectives in the form of characterizing knowledge and skills, work expertise, behavioral attitudes in work, and how to live in society, as a minimum requirement that must be achieved by students in completing a study program.
9. The core curriculum is a group of study materials and lessons that must be covered in a study program formulated in a nationally applicable curriculum.
10. The institutional curriculum is a number of study materials and lessons that are part of the higher education curriculum, consisting of additions and groups of knowledge in the core curriculum which are prepared by taking into account the circumstances and environmental needs of the characteristics of the college concerned.
11. The Personality Development Subject Group, hereinafter abbreviated as MPK, is a group of study materials and lessons to develop Indonesian human beings who are faithful and devoted to God Almighty and have noble character, steady

personality, and

independent and have a sense of community and national responsibility.

12. The Scientific and Skills Subject Group, hereinafter abbreviated as MKK, is a group of study materials and lessons aimed primarily at providing a foundation for mastering certain knowledge and skills.
13. The Working Expertise Subject Group, hereinafter abbreviated as MKB, is a group of study materials and lessons that aim to produce experts with work based on the basic knowledge and skills mastered.
14. The Working Behavior Subject Group, hereinafter abbreviated as MPB, is a group of study materials and lessons that aim to shape the attitudes and behaviors needed by a person in working according to the level of expertise based on the basic knowledge and skills mastered.
15. Group of Social Life Subjects, hereinafter abbreviated as MBB, is a group of study materials and lessons needed by a person to be able to understand the rules of social life in accordance with the choice of expertise in work.
16. Specialization Program, hereinafter abbreviated as PK, is the deepening of a student's interest in a particular field of law which is reflected in the group of subjects taken and from the writing of the final project.
17. The credit system is a system of organizing education, in which student study loads, lecturer workloads, and the burden of organizing educational institution programs are expressed in credit units.
18. Semester is the smallest unit of time to express the length of an educational program in a level of education.
19. Semester Credit System abbreviated as SKS is a credit system for a study program of an educational level that uses semester as the smallest unit of time.
20. Semester credit units abbreviated as credits are units used to express the student's study load, the amount of recognition for the success of student efforts, recognition of cumulative success for a particular study program, and efforts to provide education for universities, especially lecturers.
21. One credit is a measure of appreciation for the learning experience gained through one hour of scheduled activities accompanied by two to four hours per week of assignments or other structured or independent activities during a semester or other equivalent activity savings.
22. The research proposal seminar is a plan of activities that will be presented and discussed to prepare a thesis / thesis approved by the supervisory commission in front of the examining lecturers and students.
23. Comprehensive examination is a test of the ability to master various subjects from a study program as a whole and integrated in solving a problem.

## Article 2

- (1) Undergraduate Program education aims to meet the following learning outcomes:
  - a. Manner;
  - b. mastery of knowledge;
  - c. general skills; and
  - d. specialized skills.
- (2) The attitudinal learning outcomes as referred to in paragraph (1) letter a include:
  - a. devoted to God Almighty and able to show a religious attitude;

- b. upholding humanity values in carry out duties based on religion, morals, and ethics;
  - c. contribute in improving quality life of society, nation, state and the advancement of civilization based on Pancasila;
  - d. play a role as a citizen who is proud and loves the country, has nationalism and a sense of responsibility to the state and nation;
  - e. appreciate the diversity of culture, views, religion, and beliefs, as well as the original opinions or findings of others;
  - f. cooperate and have social sensitivity and concern for society and the environment;
  - g. law-abiding and disciplined in social and state life;
  - h. internalize academic values, norms and ethics;
  - i. showing attitude of responsible for work in their field of expertise independently; and
  - j. internalize the spirit of independence, struggle and entrepreneurship.
- (3) Knowledge mastery learning outcomes as referred to in paragraph (1) letter b include:
- a. master the theoretical concepts about;
    - 1) characteristics, structure, and theory of legal science;
    - 2) sources, principles and norms of law;
    - 3) system or Indonesia's national legal system and history of its development.
  - b. Mastering basic knowledge of the history and theoretical aspects of the field of Indonesian positive law, including civil law, criminal law, constitutional law, state administration law, international law, customary law and Islamic law;
  - c. Mastering the principles, norms and procedures for solving legal problems or cases through legal reasoning, application of legal discovery methods, which are the basis for the formulation of several forms of elementary legal documents, namely at least in the form of legal memorandum documents, legal documents for lawyers, contract legal documents, and legal documents that functions regulatively such as company regulations and decisions / decrees;
  - d. mastering and applying research methods logically and critically and being able to do legal writing properly; and
  - e. master the general concepts of knowledge of legal philosophy, legal sociology and comparative law in order to understand the law contextually, systematically and completely.
- (4) General skills learning outcomes as referred to in paragraph (1) letter c include:
- a. Adequate to develop concepts for solving legal problems or cases through the application of juridical thinking methods based on theoretical knowledge and positive law about sources, principles, principles, and legal norms from various fields of Indonesian positive law, which are basic skills for carrying out the legal profession;
  - b. Adequate to formulate ideas logically, critically, and argumentatively in the field of law and communicate them orally and/or in writing, specifically within the scope of the academic community, in accordance with academic ethics;
  - c. Adequate to make decisions appropriately, academically, independently, with integrity and responsibility in solving legal problems or cases, and able to cooperate with peers; and
  - d. Adequate to be fair, ethical, law-abiding, and care for the social environment in designing and applying laws.
- (5) General skills learning outcomes as referred to in paragraph (1) letter d include:
- a. Adequate to apply logical, critical, systematic, and innovative thinking in the contest of developing or implementing science and technology that pays attention to and applies humanities values in accordance with their field of expertise;
  - b. Adequate to demonstrate independent, quality and measurable performance;

- c. Adequate to examine the implications of the development or implementation of science and technology that pay attention to and apply humanities values in accordance with their expertise based on scientific rules, procedures and ethics in order to produce solutions, ideas, designs or art criticism;
- d. Adequate to compile a scientific description of the results of the study above in the form of a thesis or final project report, and upload it on the college website;
- e. Adequate to make appropriate decisions in the context of problem solving in their field of expertise, based on the results of information and data analysis;
- f. Adequate to maintain and develop networks with mentors, colleagues, peers both within and outside the institution;
- g. Adequate to be responsible for the achievement of group work results and supervise and evaluate the completion of work assigned to workers under their responsibility;
- h. Adequate to carry out a self-evaluation process of the work group under his responsibility, and able to manage learning independently; and
- i. Adequate to document, store and secure, and retrieve data to ensure validity and prevent plagiarism.

## CHAPTER II SCOPE OF LAW STUDY PROGRAM

### Article 3

- (1) The scope of the Undergraduate Program at the Faculty consists of one field of study, namely the Law Study Program.
- (2) The Law Study Program as referred to in paragraph (1) consists of 8 (eight) PKs, namely:
  - a. Civil Law;
  - b. Business Law;
  - c. Customary and Islamic Law;
  - d. Criminal Law;
  - e. Constitutional Law;
  - f. International Law;
  - g. Administrative Law;
  - h. Agrarian Law and Natural Resources.
- (3) PK as referred to in paragraph (2) is managed by a section consisting of:
  - a. The Civil Law Section manages the PK:
    - 1. Civil Law,
    - 2. Business Law, and
    - 3. Customary and Islamic Law;
  - b. The Criminal Law Section manages the Criminal Law Review;
  - c. The Constitutional Law Section manages the PK on Constitutional Law;
  - d. The International Law Section manages the International Law Review; and
  - e. The Administration Law Section manages the PK:
    - 1. Administration Law, and
    - 2. Agrarian Law and Natural Resources.

## CHAPTER III SEMESTER CREDIT SYSTEM

### Article 4

- (1) Undergraduate academic programs are organized using credits (SKS).
- (2) The study load of the Undergraduate Program is calculated using credits.

## Article 5

- (1) The minimum study load for the Undergraduate Program is 147 (one hundred and forty-seven) credits including the final project.
- (2) The study load as referred to in paragraph (1) is planned for 8 (eight) semesters and can be taken for a maximum of 14 (fourteen) semesters.

## CHAPTER IV CURRICULUM M

## Article 6

The Undergraduate Program curriculum consists of core and institutional curricula

## Article 7

- (1) The Core Curriculum totals 29 (twenty-nine) courses with a total weight of 74 (seventy-four) credits.
- (2) The Core Curriculum subjects as referred to in paragraph (1) consist of:
  - a. MPK Group;
  - b. MKK group; and
  - c. MKB Group;
- (3) Core Curriculum courses which include the MPK group as referred to in paragraph (3) letter a amount to 3 (three) courses with a total weight of 9 (nine) credits which include:
  - a. Civic Education;
  - b. Religious Education;
  - c. Pancasila.
- (4) Core Curriculum subjects which include the MKK group as referred to in paragraph (3) letter b amount to 18 (eighteen) subjects with a total weight of 46 (forty six) credits which include:
  - a. Subjects with a weight of 3 (three) credits are:
    1. Introduction to the Science of Law
    2. Introduction to Indonesian Law
    3. State Science
    4. Constitutional Law
    5. Civil Law
    6. Criminal Law
    7. International Law

  - b. Subjects with a weight of 2 (two) credits are:

- (5) Core Curriculum courses which include the MKB group as referred to in paragraph (3) letter c amount to 8 (eight) courses with a total weight of 19 (nineteen) credits which include:

    2. Constitutional Court Practice

- b. Subjects with a weight of 3 (three) credits, namely Research Methods and Legal Writing
- c. The course with a weight of 4 (four) credits is the Final Project.

- (1) The Institutional Curriculum consists of 103 (one hundred and three) courses with a total weight of 209 (two hundred and nine) credits.
- (2) Institutional Curriculum subjects as referred to in paragraph (1) consist of:
  - a. MPK Group;
  - b. MKK group;
  - c. MKB Group;
  - d. MPB group; and
  - e. MBB group.

### Article 9

- (3) Institutional Curriculum Subjects MPK Group as referred to in Article 8 paragraph (2) letter a totals 3 (three) subjects with a total weight of 7 (seven) credits which include:
  - a. Weight of 3 (three) credits, namely Indonesian Language
  - b. Weight of 2 (two) credits namely:
    1. English; and
    2. English for Legal Purposes.
- (4) Institutional Curriculum Subjects Group MKK, MKB, MPB and MBB as referred to in Article 8 paragraph (2) letter c, letter d and letter e amount to 7 (seven) subjects with a total weight of 16 (sixteen) credits and are managed by the faculty sequentially including:
  - a. MKK weight of 2 (two) credits, namely Law of Healthy;
  - b. MKB weight of 2 (two) credits, namely Legal Aid;
  - c. MPB weighs 2 (two) credits namely:
    1. Entrepreneurship;
    2. Ethics of the Legal Professional
    3. Philosophy of Law
  - d. MBB with a weight of 2 (two) credits, namely Sociology of Law
  - e. MBB with a weight of 4 (four) credits, namely Student Study Service (KKN)

- (3) Institutional Curriculum Subjects MPB Group as referred to in Article 8 paragraph (2) letter c amounted to 1 (one) subject with a total weight of 2 (two) credits and managed by the Civil Law section, namely Alternative Dispute Resolution Law;
- (4) Institutional Curriculum Subjects MBB Group as referred to in Article 8 paragraph (2) letter c amounted to 6 (six) subjects with a total weight of 12 (twelve) credits and managed by sections which include:
  - a. Criminal Law Section
    1. Criminalistics;
    2. Penology;
    3. Criminology.
  - b. International Law Section, Indian Ocean Areal Studies
  - c. Constitutional Law Section

#### Article 11

Students must take Institutional Curriculum courses determined by the faculty as referred to in Article 8 as many as 35 (thirty-five) courses with a total weight of 73 (seventy-three) credits.

#### Third Part Code and Distribution of Subjects per Semester

#### Article 12

- (1) Each course is assigned a Course Code.
- (2) Number and credit load of courses as referred to in Article 7 paragraph (1) and Article 8 paragraph (1) are divided proportionally in 8 (eight) semesters.
- (3) The code, manager and division of courses per semester as referred to in paragraph (2) are listed in Appendix I which is an integral part of this Rector's Regulation.

Fourth Section  
Specificity Program

Article 13

- (1) The Dean determines PK for students who have met the following requirements:
  - a. has completed a minimum study load of 100 credits;
  - b. have passed with a minimum grade of B Minus (B-) all selected PK prerequisite courses.
- (2) PK students are determined based on the highest GPA value of PK prerequisite courses.
- (3) Prerequisite subjects for each PK as referred to in paragraph (1) letter b include:

## 5. Labor Law.

### Article 14

- (1) Students who have been assigned PK as referred to in Article 13 paragraph (1) must take PK compulsory courses and PK options from 64 (sixty-four) courses offered.
- (2) Compulsory PK courses that must be taken as referred to in paragraph (1) amount to 6 (six) courses with a total weight of 12 (twelve) credits for each PK.
- (3) PK elective courses that must be taken as referred to in paragraph (1) amount to a minimum of 6 (six) courses with a total weight of 12 (twelve) credits.
- (4) Students must take at least 3 (three) PK elective courses concerned from 6 (six) PK elective courses as referred to in paragraph (3).
- (5) Elective PK courses that have been declared passed or failed can be requested to be abolished or eliminated as long as they have fulfilled the minimum number of PK elective courses as referred to in paragraph (3).
- (6) The list of faculty elective, compulsory PK, and optional PK courses as referred to in paragraph (2) and paragraph (3) is listed in Appendix II which is an inseparable part of this Rector's Regulation.

### Article 15

The procedure for determining the PK is further regulated by the Dean.

### Section Five Prerequisite Courses

#### Article 16

- (1) For courses that have a prerequisite relationship can be taken after the prerequisite course is passed with a minimum grade of C.
- (2) Subjects that have a prerequisite relationship as referred to in paragraph (1) include:
  - a. Civil Procedure Law prerequisite for Civil Court Practice;
  - b. Criminal Procedure Prerequisites for Criminal Justice Practice;
  - c. The Science and Right to Examine Laws and Regulations prerequisite for Drafting Laws and Regulations;
  - d. International Law prerequisite for Training Proficiency in International Law;
  - e. State Administrative Court Procedure Law prerequisite for State Administrative Court Practice;
  - f. Procedural Law of Constitutional Court prerequisite for Judicial practice at The Constitutional Court

## CHAPTER V PROPOSAL SEMINAR AND FINAL PROJECT

### Article 17

- (1) Final Project Research Proposals can be submitted by students who have been assigned PK and are currently / have taken Research Methods and Legal Writing courses.
- (2) Students who have been assigned PK as referred to in paragraph (1) can register for a Research Proposal Seminar with conditions:
  - a. The Final Project Proposal is approved by the supervisor;
  - b. participate in other students' Research Proposal Seminar activities at least 5 (five) times; and
  - c. other academic and administrative requirements.

- (3) Student Final Project Research Proposal as referred to in paragraph (2) which are declared feasible by the review team can proceed to the final project research stage.

#### Article 18

- (1) Every student who will complete the Bachelor Program education must complete the final project.
- (2) The final project as referred to in paragraph (1) can be in the form of:
  - a. Thesis;
  - b. Legal Case Studies;
  - c. Legal Memorandum.
- (3) Thesis as referred to in paragraph (2) letter a is a scientific paper resulting from legal research with the aim of finding solutions to legal problems or only to gain scientific knowledge about law or legal phenomena.
- (4) Legal Case Study as referred to in paragraph (2) letter b is a scientific writing that examines, discusses or analyzes:
  - a. A court decision, whether it has permanent legal force or not, with the aim of revealing the strengths or weaknesses of the judge's decision from the perspective of legal science;
  - b. a national or international arbitral award with the aim of revealing the strengths and weaknesses of the arbitral award from a legal science perspective;
  - c. A dispute case that was successfully or unsuccessfully resolved through negotiation and mediation with the aim of obtaining systematic knowledge about the negotiation and mediation process as well as the negotiation or mediation agreement from the perspective of law or other sciences.
- (5) Legal Memorandum as referred to in paragraph (2) letter c is a *legal* writing containing legal opinion on a legal provision, one or more sets of laws and regulations, and a legal dispute accompanied by conclusions or recommendations with the aim to be used by other parties or clients, or to reveal the strength or weakness of the client's legal position in a legal dispute.
- (6) Guidelines regarding the final project as referred to in paragraph (2) are regulated by the Dean.

#### Article 19

- (1) Every student who will complete the Undergraduate Program is required to pass a comprehensive examination.
- (2) The comprehensive examination as referred to in paragraph (2) may be held if the student has completed a minimum study load of 143 (one hundred forty-three) credits with the following provisions:
  - a. Have a minimum GPA of 2.00 (two point zero);
  - b. Does not have an E Grade;
  - c. Has a D Grade of no more than 2 (two) pieces;
  - d. Submit proof of TOEFL score of at least 425 (four hundred twenty-five) from the Andalas University Language Center.
- (3) Further provisions regarding the comprehensive examination are regulated by the Dean

### CHAPTER VI TRANSITIONAL PROVISIONS

#### Article 20

- (1) This curriculum applies to all students.
- (2) Students who have not passed the deleted courses can take replacement courses in the same semester based on this Rector's Regulation.

- (3) Students who have passed with a minimum grade of C compulsory faculty courses can take replacement courses in the same semester based on this Rector's Regulation.
- (4) Students who already have PK must adjust within a maximum of 2 (two) semesters since this Rector Regulation comes into effect.
- (5) In the event that students who have PK cannot adjust within the predetermined time as referred to in paragraph (4), the PK provisions as stipulated in this Rector's Regulation shall apply.
- (6) Specifically for students who have been determined as PK Criminal Justice System (SPP) students are determined as PK Criminal Law students based on this Rector's Regulation.

CHAPTER VII  
CLOSING PROVISIONS

Article 21

- (1) When this Rector's Regulation comes into force, the Rector's Regulation of Andalas University Number 22 of 2012 concerning the Undergraduate Program Curriculum of the Faculty of Law, Andalas University, is revoked and declared invalid.
- (2) This Rector's Regulation is effective as of the date of enactment.
